#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Grade 11 Global Issues embraces a multidisciplinary approach in understanding the increasingly complex questions confronting the world today. Understanding global problems is the initial stage towards conceiving globalized solutions. This course capitalizes and centers on the privileged position of the youth in their ability to pass on a better generation. The course is anchored on the seminal ideas of the Global Issues Network. It engages on three main topics concerned with (1) sharing our planet, (2) sharing our humanity, and (3) sharing our rule book.

The course follows the Salamanca Process as a framework for learning. Specifically, the framework calls for a synergy between the Dominican intellectual and apostolic life by directing study, research, analysis and action towards addressing the challenges that the world faces (Salamanca Congress Final Document, 2016). The daily routine entails study (interaction phase), research (clarification phase), analysis (questioning phase), and action (design phase). This holistic approach guides Dominicans as they carry the torch invigorating the world wherever they go.
