On the last day of the visit, many parents came to support the Administration, teachers and staff during the final meeting where the Visiting Committee announced their findings. It was a true DIS family event made possible by all our stakeholders. Without the VIP's support the visit would not have been so successful, and a special thanks goes to Ms Yvonne Hsu, our VIP President, for being on call for the entire week. The VIP took charge of the logistics of the visit, providing transport, booking accommodation, and performing many other tasks to make the visitors feel welcome.

It facilitates transfer of credits to other English-speaking schools and it is critical for college/university acceptance worldwide.

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WASC Visit

The DIS Accreditation Steering Committee



After six years of preparation at DIS, the Visiting Committee of the Western Association of Colleges and Schools (WASC) arrived at the end of March at DIS for the final stage in the accreditation process.

WASC has a six year accreditation cycle, which DIS completed with the finalization of the school's self-study and the Visiting Committee's visit at the end of March.

Even though everyone in the DIS community participated in the self-study by means of questionnaires, focus groups, home groups and interviews, the Accreditation Steering Committee drove the process. They were Sr. Zenaida Ancheta, O.P, the school's Principal, Sr. Socorro Teofilo O.P., the Vice-principal, Dr. Mercia de Souza, the school's Professional Development Coordinator, who chaired the Committee, members of the Academic Research and development Team: Mr John Dixon and Mr Samir Eddio; Ms Janice Doyle, Sr. Rosa Dabhi and Mr Joe Schoeman, the Curriculum and Academic Coordinator of the school.

They were the overseers of the process. They met weekly throughout the school's self-study process to make sure that everything for that enormous task stayed on track. They especially had to watch the time management of the project very closely. By the beginning of January, the focus groups had completed their documents – these documents investigated the school's performance in various areas very closely. Not only did the focus groups give answers to many detailed questions, but they also had to provide evidence for every answer they gave.

The Visiting Committee's task was to visit the school to see if all these answers were indeed true. They investigated by doing visits to classes, talking to parents, having discussions with students and teachers, the School Board and other stakeholders, even our neighbouring university's President, and the construction workers.

The accreditation Steering Committee had to answer many questions about the school, and clarify many issues.

The Visiting Committee (VC) Chairperson, Mr Bill Christelman, commented more than once that the DIS self-study was one of the best self-study documents he had seen in the many years of being a VC Chairperson. After the accreditation week, a VC Chairperson, who was in Taiwan to visit another school, saw the self-study while visiting DIS in an unofficial capacity and commended the school for the excellent self-study document.





Global Issues Network Conference

South Korea 2017

The Global Issues Network students, Ms Agosh Librea and Dr Mercia de Souza attended the GIN conference at Chadwick International School in Songdo, South Korea from February 24 to 26.

The key note speakers gave everyone food for thought, and hopefully the motivation to find solutions to the pressing global issues that next generations will face.

The first speaker, Hyeonseo Lee , is a North Korean refugee and defector living in Seoul, South Korea. Her memoir, "The Girl With Seven Names", was published in July 2015 in more than 20 countries. Over 7 million people have viewed her TED Talk about her life in North Korea, her escape to China and struggle to bring her family to freedom. Hyeonseo told the delegates about the terrible abuse of human rights in North Korea. Marian Marzynzki survived the holocaust as a child in Poland. He has spent the majority of his life working in media, making numerous films, and winning many awards along the way. He made very disturbing comparisons between political leaders today and Adolf Hitler.

Recently nominated Young Asian Leader of 2016 representing Indonesia, Gedi Robi Supriyanto is dedicated to supporting the youth of Indonesia to seek change in their lives through positive activism that brings about the negotiated shifts in attitude that can influence governments and policy makers to create sustainable solutions to the current problems facing the world. With a focus on empowerment and the environment, Robi's work takes him around the region to youth conferences and seminars. As the leader of Indonesia's most popular live grunge rock band, Navicula, Robi is able to express his passion for the natural world through music - creating hard driving songs of discontent, such as Metropolutan and soulful ballads such as Di Rimba (The Forest) and Harimau (Tiger). One of the band's most popular anthems is Mafia Hukum, a song that decries corruption in any form. The students were singing and clapping along while this dynamic young activist was singing about sustainability and global issues.

Gary Bencheghib is an environmental activist and documentarian who uses video and music as media weapons to bring awareness about environmental pollution. From sailing down the Mississippi River on a boat built from discarded plastic bottles, to documenting the biggest environmental group in the history of Indonesia, to following Rob Greenfield wearing every piece of trash he created for a month, his work has been viewed by tens of millions on the Internet worldwide.

He serves as an Ocean Ambassador for the Ocean Recovery Alliance and Global Alert, one of the world's first global environmental problem-solving platforms. He was a true inspiration to the DIS students who live on an island and are aware of problems with pollution in the ocean surrounding the country.


