




Welcome to DIS!



THE SUNFLOWER AMBASSADOR PEER HELPING PROGRAM

The Sunflower Ambassador Peer Helpers are composed of 12 girls and 12 boys who best exemplify the virtues of a good peer/student. Those nominated should demonstrate respect for staff, students and the school community; show compassion, courage, respect, dedication and inspiration; and be positive role models for their classmates, staff and peers.

STUDENTS NOMINATED MUST BE IN 4TH GRADE AND BE NOMINATED BY A PEER IN THE SAME GRADE.

Listed below are the virtues developed by the Second Step Counselling curriculum.

Those students nominated must demonstrate one or more of the virtues.

- · Respect: A caring and regard for the value, dignity, uniqueness, and safety of self and others;
- · Responsibility: A willing fulfilment of obligations to self and others and accountability for one's conduct;
- Compassion: Empathy for others, combined with the demonstration of kindness and support;
- Courage: Acting on your beliefs even in the face of adversity.

When the grade 4 students voted, they did not only write the name of the nominee, they also wrote down the reasons why they believe the nominee was the best person to become a Sunflower ambassador. When kids struggle with problems, they automatically turn to their friends. These nominees will be taught the crucial skills necessary for building healthy relationships, including the following:

Communication- asking questions and listening for content and feelings.

Assertiveness- expressing rights and desires, dealing with peer pressure and managing sensitive issues.

Confidentiality- honouring what others share and deciding when safety concerns override it.

Decision-making- weighing information and evaluating choices.

Conflict Mediation- dealing with disagreements and reaching peaceful solutions.

These grade 4 students will be the incoming leaders of the lower school students next school year (being grade 5 students) so they will be groomed to be good leaders. The Sunflower Ambassador peer helpers will be trained so that they can be good role models to the lower school students.







LANGUAGE ARTS — Mr. James Grade 4

Paper Mosaic

The focus of Quarter 3 is to engage children's artistic consciousness in basic activities that enable them to visually manipulate available art materials, arrange colors based on a design or pattern, and to use the available tools to create or express a visually aesthetic product.

The activity is aimed to challenge the Grade 1 students to produce work of art with the limited option of using only bits and pieces of colored paper.
